The paper will analyse the behaviours of Export-Credit Agencies(ECA), a specific class of public financial institution, through a mixed-methods approach including a network model of relational lending data and elite interviews of agency personnel.

This study will additionally help identify and accommodate the possible trade concerns of the developing economies in Europe's green transition

This will be done through a case study on the potential multi-dimensional trade-related impacts of the CSDDD on relevant segments of Indian Industry with significant environmental externalities as well as contributing substantially to India's exports to the EU. The proposed study will investigate the supply chains of EU companies connected to diverse Indian industries and their feeders and then assess the potential implications of the CSDDD on its trade participation practices.
